ONE TREE HILL COLLEGE TEACHER BOUND FOR RIO

Social Sciences teacher Christine McKnight will be at the Rio 2016 Paralympic games as a tennis official. Mrs McKnight has been involved with tennis umpiring for 30 years and has appeared at major international tennis events including the Australian Open and Wimbledon. The Rio 2016 Paralympic Games will be held from 7-18 September 2016. Around 4,350 athletes from more than 160 countries will travel to Rio to compete in 528 medal events (225 medals for women, 265 for men and 38 mixed medals) in 23 different sports across 20 venues. ONE TREE HILL COLLEGE SUCCESS AT WEIGHTLIFTING CHAMPIONSHIPS

Well done to the students who competed in the National Secondary Schools - Auckland Division competition on Saturday 27 August. The weightlifting team has trained very hard, and this showed with some very good results. A special mention goes to Dean Par, who competed in his fourth NZSS competition and lifted a personal best in both the snatch (66kg) and clean & jerk (86kg) for a total of 152kg and was awarded 1st Place in the Men's under 56kg class, qualifying for the New Zealand Nationals later this year. An Son completed in his first weightlifting competition and finished 1st in his weight and age group. Tiffany Gunn and Esther Prakash both competed in their second nationals finishing 3rd and 4th respectively in their weight and age groups. Ezael Maea-Brown finished 3rd in his age and weight class and also lifted a personal best. David Tatafu and Logan Parangi finished 5th and 6th respectively in their weight divisions. One Tree Hill College are very fortunate to have a great coaching team comprised of Commonwealth Games coach, Tina Ball, Daniel Ball and former One Tree Hill College students David Liti and Anthony Taylor. It is their combined drive and dedication, along with Mr Blincoe, that has been influential in the success of the One Tree Hill College weightlifting team.
