Principal's Message



Dear Parents and Caregivers

Despite the challenges that we all have had to endure over the last few weeks, our focus has remained on quality teaching and learning to engage every student at One Tree Hill College. It is great to see many of our daily routines and co-curricular activities quickly re-establishing.

In the junior college, it was exciting to meet parents and caregivers of Year 9 students at the Year 9 Information Evening on Tuesday 23 February. During the evening, academic programmes, whānau organisation, pastoral care, BYOD, the KAMAR parent portal and co-curricular activities were all discussed. There are three blocks of time when teachers and staff are available on 18 March: 8.00am-11.25am, 2.00pm-4.25pm and 5.15pm-7.15pm. I would like to remind you that on 18 March there are no lessons, and students will be not be required at school, except for the interview times which students are expected to attend with their parents/caregivers in full school uniform.

Finally, I would like to congratulate our girls softball team who have just won the Auckland Secondary School Softball Championship. We reached the final by scoring 2 runs in the last innings to beat Westlake Girls High School 2-1. In the final we were down 0-4 to MAGS and scored 5 runs in our last at bat to win 5-4. KAMAR Parent and Student Portal

The KAMAR parent and student portal is now available at One Tree Hill College. This gives students, parents and caregivers the ability to access personal school information from any web browser.

Personal user names and passwords were emailed to primary caregivers – please contact the college if you did not receive this information. The portal gives access to the following functions:

Mobile Phones



We acknowledge for many students, mobile phones are an integral part of their daily lives and for the majority, the most popular form of electronic communication and family organisation. However, as a school, we have observed over-reliance on the mobile phone for social connection, intrusion into young peoples' lives, and limiting a teachers' ability to effectively teach at times (due to inappropriate use, phones being lost, and miscommunication on social media). As a school, we believe that young people benefit from face-to-face interaction with peers and an environment that fosters understanding of each other through verbal communication.

It is the expectation of the school that phones and headphones/ear buds are not to be used or seen inside any school buildings (classrooms, corridors and all other indoor spaces) at any time during the day. 'Use' includes playing music, using the internet (including apps), texting, phone calls etc. Students who do not follow these expectations, will have their mobile phones confiscated and only returned when collected by their parent/caregiver.
