2023 YEAR 9 ENROLMENTS

All enrolments for 2023 will be governed under an enrolment scheme. Please refer to our website for more details and a map of the One Tree Hill College zone.

In Zone Enrolments:

All in zone students must apply for enrolment by submission of a fully completed online enrolment form and all required supplementary documentation <u>and</u> attend an interview on our special enrolment days on Wednesday 29 or Thursday 30 June 2022, 8am to 7pm. No appointments are required. All students must be with their parents/guardians and bring proof of ID (passport or birth certificate), latest school report and original proof of address (utility bill - power, water, rates are the only accepted proof of address).

Out of Zone Enrolments:

All out of zone students for 2023 must apply for enrolment by submission of a fully completed online enrolment form and all required supplementary documentation. No interview is required at this stage. The last day for out of zone online enrolments is Wednesday 7 September 2022. All out of zone enrolments are provisional until the ballot takes place on Wednesday 14 September 2022. All families will be contacted regarding the outcome of the ballot process.

THE GOODSPACE SURVEY

One Tree Hill College continuously seeks way of improving the wellbeing of our students. Since wellbeing has many facets, improving students' wellbeing in schools requires a whole-school approach and takes into account the emotional, physical, social and societal needs.

We see wellbeing in schools as an essential function as adolescence is a critical period in the development of long-term attitudes towards personal wellbeing and lifestyle choices. The social and emotional skills, knowledge and behaviours that young people learn in the classroom help them build resilience and set the pattern for how they will manage their physical and mental health throughout their lives.

The school has an established wellbeing programme for Year 13 students. This year, One Tree Hill College is working with a wellbeing team from GoodSpace Schools Ltd to create a more integrated, personalised response to the wellbeing needs of our school. This includes a completion of a wellbeing survey for all Year 13 students. As a result of the survey, all students with identified needs will be provided a personal care plan based on their responses with students of higher needs prioritised. The care plan may include referrals to validated self-help tools, signposting to local NGOs, peer group sessions, individual sessions with the team at the Wellness Centre and for some students, a coordinated response including family members may be put in place.

Although we are currently starting with Year 13 students, we aim to extend this programme to other year groups across the senior school in a phased manner. This is part of our school's ongoing commitment to supporting the overall well-being of our students, which in turn enhances their learning.
