#### **Dear Parents and Caregivers**

I would like to begin by paying tribute to Whaea Meriana Smith, Curriculum Leader Te Reo Maori, who passed away suddenly during the holidays. Whaea Meriana was an excellent teacher, who contributed significantly to the college. Whaea Meriana was passionate about enhancing outcomes for our Maori students and will be sadly missed by us all. Whaea Meriana's whanau has expressed their gratitude for the support from our entire college community during this difficult time.

# Sports Tournament Week Netball

The One Tree Hill College Premier team competed in the Upper North Island Secondary Schools (UNISS) netball tournament in Auckland. Following on from previous successful years, the team was competing for the first time in A Grade. The team had a strong start to the week quickly qualifying for the top 16. A narrow loss in a nail-biter game against Howick College (NZ Champions) meant the girls missed out on making the top 8 and a chance to compete at the National Championship. Despite this loss, the team refocussed and continued to play some outstanding netball during the week. With an outstanding performance, and lots of side-line support, the girls finished in 9<sup>th</sup> place overall in the Upper North Island. A huge thank you is extended to the premier coach, Leonie Leaver and the management who assisted with making the week so successful.









#### <u>Football</u>

The Boys 1<sup>st</sup> XI football team competed in the Malcolm Cowie Cup tournament at Papakura. The boys had a very strong start with wins in their first three pool matches. A draw in the fourth against Kings College saw them earn a spot to compete in the cup quarter finals. The quarter final match was locked one all at full time with the winner decided by penalty kicks, unfortunately our boys lost 6 goals to 7. The team went on to finish 8<sup>th</sup> overall in the tournament. Congratulations to Mr Holt and the team for a very successful 2017 football season.

The Girls 1<sup>st</sup> XI football team competed in the Northern tournament in Whangarei. There were some good victories, such as the game against Thames High School, where the girls put on an excellent performance winning through a penalty shootout. Natasha Leadbetter won 'most valuable player' for the tournament. Overall the team were placed 13<sup>th</sup>.

#### <u>Hockey</u>

A mixed team (8 boys and 8 girls) attended the North Island mixed hockey tournament in Taupo. The team had a tough draw as they were drawn in the same pool as last year's runner-up. Their results for the tournament placed the team in the play off for 14<sup>th</sup> position.

#### Basketball

The team had some strong programmes at the Northern Cup. Their Coach, Ollie Bryce, is very proud of how the boys performed. While challenging, the lessons learned for the development of the programme have been significant. Overall the team were placed in 14<sup>th</sup> position.

#### **Freedom Day**

During term 3, Year 10 Social Studies students worked on an NCEA Level 1 assessment. They researched and learnt about the palm oil trade and the plight of the people who work in it.

The students' task was to take part in a "Freedom Day" where they set up stalls to create awareness about what is happening.

Some stalls raised money, as well as awareness, and over \$800 was raised for Amnesty International.

Students are now writing up their reports.
